

What are the huts

- Part of Australian heritage
- Earlier generations ways of living and working
- Used for summer grazing, forestry, mining, research, hydro-electricity, skiing, bushwalking, and fishing
- Huts provide shelter, refuge in emergencies
- Ruins of significance are maintained & stabilised
- Valued by descendants whose families built them






Kosciuszko National Park



- 1944 recommendation for chain of huts throughout mountains
- Establishment of Parks –walkers & skiers looked after huts
- 1965 Kosciusko State Park Trust convened to discuss future of huts
- 1967 National Parks and Wildlife Service formed
- NPWS obliged by the ACT of Parliament to look after heritage buildings



Before KHA

- It was Dr Schlink who arranged to have Tin Hut built in 1927 in readiness for the Kiandra to Kosciusko crossing. Other huts built and maintained were Bretts Camp 1909:Pounds Creek 1920: Seamans1928:Alpine 1939:Albina and Koonama 1950:
- In 1960 many huts were looked after by caretaker groups
- In January 1965 The Kosciusko State Park Trust convened a meeting a document titled

"Recommendations regarding Jagungal Wilderness area, including preservation of shelter huts"



History of the Mountain Huts



Huts were built by stockmen, SMHA, prospectors, recreational fishermen to meet accommodation, shelter, recreational and hydrology needs


Many of the huts have been destroyed by fire, decay, weather conditions

98 huts remain

Leaseholders maintained or modified the huts



- 1970 Neville Gare Superintendent of Kosciusko State Park called a meeting and motion was passed
- "That an Association tentatively to be named the Kosciusko Huts Association be formed and an interim committee be elected"

- 1971 Two objectives in the Draft policy of KHA
 - "to advise the NPWS on the use, maintenance and development of huts in the KNP and
 - to assist the NPWS in the management and maintenance of huts in the KNP"
- First year of KHA it was agreed to effectively maintain the huts was to use existing & encourage new caretaker groups
- The HMO was seen as an essential function
- The huts maintenance newsletter was circulated all members
- Excellent response cleared the way for allocation of other huts

• 1972-73 - A list of huts and an information booklet on the huts "Notes for caretakers of shelter huts" produced by the committee

• Membership had almost trebled since beginning of year 170 vs 58 end



Letter from Superintendent of KNP in 1976

- "approval will not be given for addition of any new huts for survival system..." A wilderness advocate argues in KHA's newsletter that "huts are alien to wilderness, the argument of huts for safety is spurious and if they are removed then those that enter either survive or perish, which is what wilderness is all about"
- Another hut destroyed by fire –Ranger implicated -----
- Two girls survived staying in Four Mile Hut




• A submission Feb 1976 offered certain criteria for retention of huts offered by Senior Ranger, Planning:

- "Promotes survival in climatically dangerous areas without promoting dependence upon huts
- Clearly and regularly serves Park management purposes
- Supplements social recreational activities, has rare historical value."

50th Anniversary of the first crossing of Kiandra to Kosciusko -1927 supported by KHA *1976 – 150 people skied the old route*

Original team, Drs Herbert Schlink, Eric Fisher, John Laidley, Mr William Gordon & Mr William Hughes set off in July 1927



• *1977 – '78*

- Peter Arriens publishes "Kosciusko Huts and Wilderness Values"
- "KHA can look back on pride on work done in maintaining huts for shelter and enjoyment and safety. Many are in better condition since KHA was formed. This work preserves Australian cultural history and opportunity to experience occupying these simple buildings in living, authentic settings"
- "KHA was founded in close proximity with NPWS in a spirit of idealism....."
- KHA draft a policy on use, maintenance and development of huts in KNP
- Klaus Hueneke is commissioned to produce a film on "The Huts of the High Country"
- Membership had reached 300


- · 1978
- NPWS issued a policy which threatened the existence of the huts.
- Huge public outcry saved all but two huts (Rawson's and Albina)
- The Burra Charter was drafted in 1979 ensuring the development of conservation philosophy in Australia. The ICONOMOS charter defines historic site and how it should be conserved and maintained

- 1980 "Kosciusko huts in danger" from NPWS preferred option:
- "To demolish all huts in the summit area except Seamans
- To demolish all huts in the White Rivers Corridor except Disappointment Spur and refurbish White Rivers
- Demolish Boobee, O'Keefes, Grey Hill Café, Happy's, Dr Phillips, Happy Jacks 3&4, & Tantangara. *Albina & Rawsons* became sacrificial lambs
- Huts 100years old- Old Currango, Tin Mine Workshed, & Gooandra to fall to the ground
- To emasculate the KHA by severely limiting its current independence and responsibilities"

1981-'84

- Funding from Heritage Council of NSW allows KHA to begin KNP Historic
 Sites Project
- First Film and Social evening attracts 100 people
- 30 huts have been lost since 1970
- Excess of 200 identifiable ruins and 90 structure still standing of which 10 are still threatened by official removal
- Of the 80 huts proposed to stay, 20 in moderately good condition, 60 vary from poor to fair

1985-'86

- Dr Phillips removed. Pockets vandalised. Montagues destroyed by fire.
- Constance Proposal submitted to NPWS



- Coolamine Homestead funded by the Australian Heritage Commission grant, the biggest restoration project undertaken in 30years.
- NPWS completed major works on the most abused and used hut-Delaney's due to its location

Coolamine

- Special Projects sub-committee begins work on a submission to stabilise structures classified as "ruins" in the Plan of Management
- Several new sub-committees were formed in 1987



• A big increase in the number of caretaker groups enabling a surge in the conservation of huts.

· 1988

- Cool Plain & Slaughterhouse destroyed by fire. Happys escapes with singeing
- Bill Jones saved from demolition
- NSW Premier accused NPWS of "being unreasonably obstructive...for years..." KHA expressed concern to the Minister about development within Park.
- Huts in Namadgi NP in ACT come under KHA.

1988 cont

- HMO appointed
- Conservation work carried out ACT Forests and Franks Hut and survey on all huts in Namadgi
- Huts in Namadgi NP in ACT come under KHA
- KHA now has 3 HMO's -North, South and Namadgi
- KHA steps up negotiations for fuel reduction around huts

- NPWS approval for stabilisation policy-Teddys hut becomes first structure to benefit
- NPWS & KHA agree on huts Priority List
- ACT Heritage grant for \$18,300 to research Namadgi oral history
- Burrungubuggee hut construction begins, Official opening November '90
- Centenary of Kiandra Courthouse and KHA contributes to "Back to Kiandra" celebrations




• 1991 Patron Paddy Pallin dies aged 90

Frank Austin Pallin (28.11.1900 1.3.1991), better known as Paddy Pallin, was a founder member of the KHA
in 1970 and later became its patron.
Paddy was a great lover of bushwalking, cross-country skiing and the Australian bush. Throughout his life he was
concerned to help Australia's young
people, particularly by encouraging
them to enjoy outdoor activities. A very
active man, he continued skiing until he
was 86!

The inaugural 1965 Paddy Pallin Classic was a cross country skiing race that was organised by Paddy. The route was over a distance of more than 60 kilometres from Round Mountain to Perisher in the Kosciusko National Park, Australia. The six starters were hampered by bad weather and for safety reasons crossed the finish line together after seven and a half hours. Subsequent Paddy Pallin Classics have used safer routes.



Built 1945 by Dan and Rob Benson for the Water and Irrigation Commission. Used by Nankervis and Mitchell families, SMA 1950s, Youth Hostel 1960s and 1970s until resumed by NPWS. Over the years the hut has been known as YHA, Youth Hostel, Ibis, Bensons, and Commissioners. In recent years the hut has been lovingly restored by Noel Gough's caretaker groups. Geehi (Airstrip)

Built 1952 by Don Benson and Nankervis family as grazier's shelter, with toilet, laundry and shed (last two emoved by NPWS 1970s) Complex of huts became public shelter, picnic and rest areas during the 1980s.


